You could have made her truly independent; instead, her motivations are all about the

power associated with "Joker." Harley the anarchist might have been the idea, but that fell short. Since Phillips keeps saying that Arthur Fleck isn't actually Joker, I could almost see what he was trying to do for Harley in a world where the Joker doesn't technically exist yet, but it didn't land.

However, he did stick the landing with the point that Arthur is not Joker, but at the expense of developing the few characters around him. At some point, they'll possibly make a Harley



movie, maybe a Two-Face and a Joker 3. Todd won't make them, but he built the universe. A grittier one that set the bar, and Reeves took the challenge in The Batman. Phillips did what Sony wanted to do with Venom: establish the villain without the hero. Maybe this "New York" Gotham (as opposed to the New Jersey Gotham of Reeves' world) will find a home under Gunn



& Safran's DC Studios. An Elseworld visited at some point just because; maybe it ends here, a weak sequel full of bad renditions of popular songs.

If they do go the way of expanding on this universe... at least we had the first film. At least we got Phoenix playing Fleck so well that he got a statue for it, which, for us comic fans, was nice to see.
